It was great news for her parents. They hoped for a new beginning for Anima. With the help of assistive devices like hearing aid, Anima was able to hear and slowly began to speak. However, the three years' delivery came to an end with the discontinuation of the aids.

BRAC's children with special needs (CSN) programme came to know of Anima; she was 10 years old at the time. The unit enrolled Anima in Hatabo BRAC School of Narsingdi district. The well-planned environment of the school catered to Anima's needs.

Anima now studies in class 4. Everybody knows her as a good student. She has also developed an interest in dancing. Recently, Anima had a dance performance on a cultural programme that showcases talented children with disability, telecast on BTV and ATN Bangla. . She also demonstrated extraordinary skills during sports competitions at the divisional and national levels. Anima can now confidently participate in various activities just like any other child.

Anima dreams to become a teacher and a dancer. The kindness and support she received from her teachers have clearly directed her towards a more positive future. The pride of her parents, Anima is moving forward, slowly but confidently.
