OUR PROGRAMMES: *Education, Empowerment and Livelihood for Adolescents, Health*

In 2017 we operated in 35 community girls schools with 1050 students in Juba. We signed agreements with The Women Union, Madral Development Organisation and State Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry to provide livelihood training to 300 girls through our adolescent clubs. We provided healthcare services to communities to reduce maternal and under-five mortality and morbidity through a network of health workers.

OUR TEAM: We have a small team of total of 8 staff, of whom 25% are female and 50% are nationals of South Sudan.

CHALLENGE: South Sudan is still reeling from the effects of conflict, massive displacement, devaluation of local currency and price hikes which affect our operations. Security of staff is a priority for us. In June of 2017, BRAC International conducted an analysis of the country context in order to reposition and redesign our programmes and mode of operation with appropriate staffing and set up. For now, we are working on a limited scale and building local capacity and resilience in the communities.

HIGHLIGHTS 2017 (JANUARY-DECEMBER)

- Provided vocational training for **300** students (tailoring, catering, hairdressing and jewelry)
- A total of **24,187** students graduated from **905** CGS; and **98%** of them mainstreamed to government primary school in Grade-V
- Provided antenatal care to **2,140** pregnant women
- Provided general treatment to **14,905** patients through **154** mobile clinics
- Provided symptomatic treatment of malaria at community level to **1,800** under five children
- Trained **120** community health promoters
- **1,002** women received care during birth by trained CHP
- Trained **200** community based drug distributors who provided treatment for pneumonia for **199** children under five
