Overall humanitarian context and needs

The response for the fire incident in the camps include united efforts from the government and various development actors. Service providers are supporting the camps and host communities with emergency food, drinking water, healthcare, temporary emergency shelter and psychosocial support. All agencies are working in collaboration with the camp in-charges and the sectoral camp focals to ensure an effective recovery. BRAC's non-food items and shelter team members are active on the ground to support the affected populations.

Psychosocial support for people of all ages and gender are vital now, to help them cope with the traumatic experiences caused by the fire.

There is an immediate need to reconstruct learning centres, child-friendly spaces and women-friendly spaces in the camps. The populations affected require a safe space to share their experiences and engage in social interactions with other community members.

KEY OBJECTIVES OF JOINT AID RESPONSE

1. ASSIST people with immediate, life-saving needs as a result of the fire

2. REBUILD and repair damaged facilities to restore essential services for people in need

3. PREPARE and improve fire prevention mechanisms in the camps.

WASH

- **950** people received information on hygiene management
- **27** latrines, **six** bathing cubicles, **five** deep tube wells, and **three** shallow tube wells repaired
- **14** latrines desludged
- **4,330** feet wasted drain cleaned

Health

- **167** people received emergency medical support from mobile healthcare facilities
- **One** of the patients had burn injuries caused by the fire

Child Protection

- **13** children (seven girls and six boys) reunited with their families
- **1,039** people (278 women, 210 men, 296 girls, 255 boys) including **seven** persons (three women, one man, two girls, one boy) with disabilities provided with psychological first-aid by trained para-counsellors
- **747** children (386 girls, 361 boys) including **two** children with disabilities (two boys) provided psychological first-aid at the temporary child-friendly spaces
