Overall humanitarian needs

Today marks the seventh day of the fire in the Rohingya camps, with hundreds of emergency responders working round the clock to provide crucial support to the communities affected.

The fire has damaged 12,413 shelters and 3,198 facilities, affecting over 60,000 people. Reports so far have confirmed 13 deaths and 563 injuries. The response carried out since the fire has been massive, with all service providers working in coordination with the government and UN bodies.

However, there have been a few reports of challenges faced by field staff working in the areas affected. Service providers have been distributing packed meals to people who have lost their shelters and belongings. A huge amount of waste is being generated from this food distribution which are then thrown in the drains and surrounding areas, as there are no designated waste bins or garbage disposals.

Protection staff on the ground have shared that there is a need for more menstrual hygiene kits for women and girls. Furthermore, displaced populations residing in the nearby camps are facing challenges accessing basic services, since the allocated resources are not enough to cater to such large populations.

Discussions are being held with the communities affected and other service providers, which will help identify existing gaps and develop a more comprehensive plan to assist both the Rohingya and host communities affected by the fire.

WASH

- **948** people received information on hygiene
- **One** water network, **two** tap stands, **29** latrines, **27** bathing cubicles, **nine** deep tube wells, and **six** shallow tube wells repaired
- **50** trucks of debris cleaned
- **27** latrines desludged

Health

- **127** people (52 women, 55 men, and 20 children under-five) received emergency medical support from mobile healthcare facilities
- **Two** patients with burn injuries were treated

General Food Assistance

- **16,051** packets of cooked food (two meals a day) provided to **8,051** people
- **18** families received **5kg** of high energy biscuit packets each

Child Protection

- **17** children (six girls and 11 boys) reunited with their families; **nine** of them (five girls, four boys) were identified today and **eight** (one girl, seven boys) were previously identified
- **1,679** people (424 girls, 396 boys, 403 women, 456 men) including one woman with a disability, provided with psychological first-aid by trained para-counsellors
- **2,021** children (920 girls and 1,101 boys) including one boy with a disability, given psychological first-aid at temporary child-friendly spaces
- **Four** new temporary child-friendly spaces set up today to provide psychological first-aid in Camp 8w and Camp 9

Protection

- **345** women and **156** girls received psychological first-aid by a psychosocial counsellor
- **35** women and **five** girls referred for health services
- **79** adolescent girls engaged in recreational activities

Education

- **12** temporary learning centres repaired today
- **16** temporary learning centres being used to provide psychosocial support and protection from sexual exploitation and abuse
